












Arbor Day Festival at Dawes Arboretum

Surrender at Appomattox: The Licking County Connection

presented by Kevin Bennett

March 24, 2015 7:00 - 8:00 p.m. Main Library, Meeting Room A



With the surrender of General Lee's Confederate Army at Appomattox on April 9, 1865, the Civil War effectively ended. While this historic event is generally remembered, less known is the key role played by a native of Licking County, Major General Charles Griffin. Not only did Griffin perform in the critical battlefield role as the commander of the V Corps of the victorious Union Army, he also was appointed by U.S. Grant as the Surrender Commissioner to oversee the actual capitulation of the Con-

federates. Retired Army officer and local historian Kevin Bennett will present this talk covering the meteoric career of this remarkable officer and outline the strong local connection to this national historic event.

The Assassination of Lincoln and the Pursuit of Booth,

presented by Steve Long Apr. 28, 2015 7:00 - 8:00 p.m. Main Library Meeting Room A

Days after the surrender of Robert E. Lee and the Army of Northern Virginia, the nation was rocked by the assassination of President Lincoln. This program will start at the church down the street from Ford's Theatre, to the theater where Lincoln was shot and then to the hunt for John Wilkes Booth. Steve will talk about why Lincoln's guard was at a tavern at the time of the shooting and what happened to 18 pages from Booth's diary, and how a brothel led to Booth's capture.

Steve Long lives in Zoarville, Ohio and retired from the New Philadelphia Times-Reporter in 2006 as the editorial page editor. He has

been interested in the Civil War since he was 16 and gives programs on various battles and aspects. Steve's major local project has been a visual history of the 51st Ohio Volunteer Infantry, which mostly came from Tuscarawas County.

Meet Mary Harmon Head of Adult Services

Mary Harmon was born in Australia and lived there until the age of four. Back in Ohio, she was raised by a scuba diving enthusiast who passed down his love of adventure to her. When Mary is not skydiving, whitewater rafting, diving in the Gulf of Mexico or traversing the wilds of the Licking County Library, she spends time on her quaint five-acre homestead with her husband and young daughter.

After achieving a Bachelor's degree in Sociology and German Literature from Muskingum University in Ohio, Mary spent some time studying in Germany. Following that, she decided to work in public libraries and pursued the Master of Library & Information Science degree from Kent State University, which she achieved in 2009. She then worked in several Ohio libraries, holding a variety of positions, including Circulation Clerk, Youth Outreach Coordinator, Reference Librarian and Adult Services Coordinator.

Mary's first position with Licking County Library was Branch Supervisor at the Hebron Library. She quickly rose to her current position as Head of Adult Services at the Main Library. After two-and-a-half years in that position, Mary has helped refine and expand the scope of what a twenty-first century library is and can be.

Local History Corner

Anna D. Stare; First Female CPA in Ohio By Dan Fleming, Adult Services Librarian

It's tax time again. Today, we don't think twice about allowing a woman to prepare our taxes, but that was unheard of before the 1930s. Anna Stare was the very first female certified public accountant in Ohio, and she set up shop doing just that in Newark for her father's business and many others.

Anna was born in 1883 to Louis A. and Mary Ann Stare. Louis was a successful cabinet maker and also worked as a contractor with tile and marble. He served six terms on the Newark City Council and was president of its finance committee. Anna followed closely in his footsteps. Both served on community chest fund drives in Newark. After the death of Louis in 1934, Anna took over his business until her own death on November 16, 1938.

She was also a charter member and the first president of the Newark Business and Professional Women's Club as well as a past president of the same group on the state level. She was on the executive board of the American Red Cross, Licking County Chapter, and a member of the Newark Garden Club and the Ohio Society of Certified Public Accountants..

Anna's father Louis had a brother named Frank L. Stare. Frank and his wife Rhoda had Frank L., Jr. who died in 1983. Yes, as you might have guessed, Frank, Jr. had a son, Frank L. Stare, III who was the first to serve three consecutive 4-year terms as Mayor of Newark from 1992-2003.

Best of all, Anna Stare, who never married, broke ground for other women to enter the CPA profession in Ohio.
